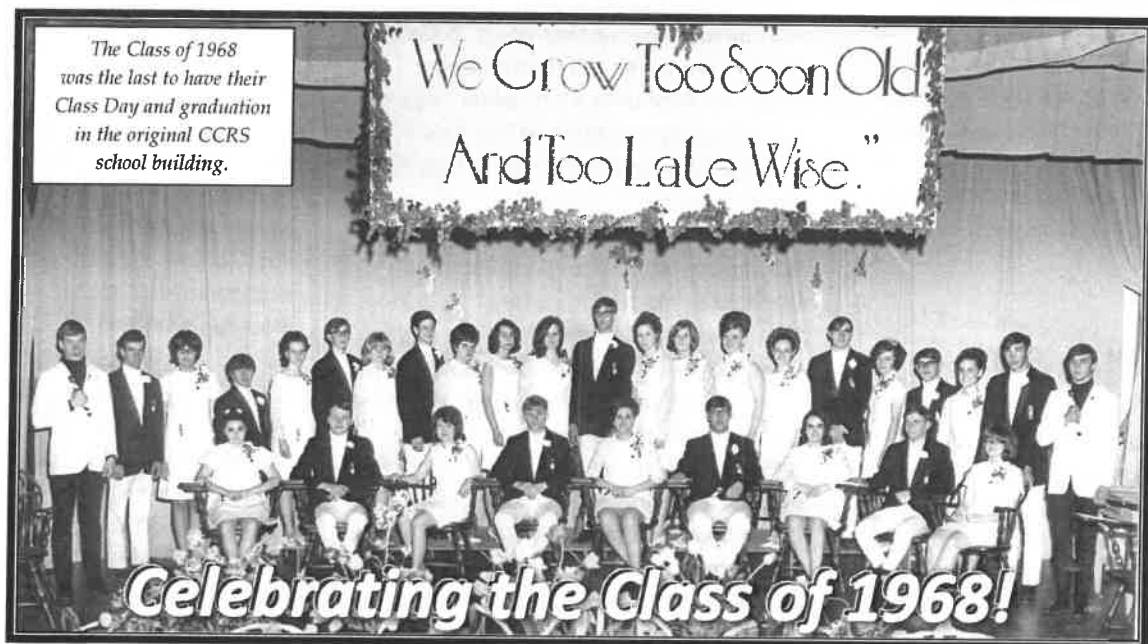

Brian Cote

"After graduation I attended Syracuse University, graduating in 1972 with a B.A. in History and a commission as a Second Lieutenant in the USAF. Uncle Sam sent me to Williams AFB in Arizona for pilot training and I earned my wings in October 1973. I remained at Williams as an Instructor Pilot until 1975 when I was reassigned to Randolph AFB in San Antonio, TX to train other pilots how to become Instructor Pilots. While there, I became (at the time) the first and only first assignment instructor pilot to be selected to the Headquarters Standardization/Evaluation Team, which evaluated the training effectiveness at the eleven initial pilot/navigator training bases for the entire USAF. I also became one of only six Air Training Command Spin Pilots. In 1982 I was reassigned to RAF Lakenheath in the United Kingdom where I flew the F-111F. I was selected to be the unit Vice Commander for Inspections (IG), which meant that it was my job to prepare the unit for inspections from NATO and the United States Air Forces in Europe IG teams. It also meant that I acted as a member of the NATO Inspection Team evaluating other NATO countries' forces. I met my wife Kim while at RAF Lakenheath and we were married in December 1984. In August 1985 we were reassigned to Mt. Home AFB in Idaho where I was an instructor pilot in the F-111A. Flying from Mt. Home, I participated in numerous Red Flag Exercises which involved forces from many NATO countries. I also flew in a Maple Flag Exercise which was a joint exercise with US and Canadian forces. Due to my experience at RAF Lakenheath in the IG, I was selected to the same

position at Mt Home. I led the unit to the first ever Mobility Inspection in which every facet of the evaluation was rated as Outstanding by the Tactical Air Command Inspector General Team. The AF sent me back to the United Kingdom at RA Upper Heyford to fly the F-111E in 1988. While there, I was the Operations Officer for the 55th Tactical Fighter Squadron, and the Chief of Safety for the entire base. My last duty assignment was at 12th AF Headquarters at Bergstrom AFB in Austin, TX where I was a Flying Safety staff officer. I retired from the USAF in 1993 with a rank of Lieutenant Colonel with over 4,000 hours in fighter-type aircraft and moved back to San Antonio, TX. I had been hired by Southwest Airlines earlier in 1993, but had not yet received a start date for employment, so I filled the interim by teaching special education at a middle school (7th and 8th grades) in Seguin, TX. In January 1994 I started flying for Southwest Airlines. Initially I flew as a First Officer based in Houston, TX. In 1999 I upgraded to Captain, initially flying out of Houston and then transferring to Baltimore, MD, all the while commuting from San Antonio. We discovered The Villages, FL (Disney World for adults) and moved there in 2012 so I could fly out of Orlando and no longer have to commute to work. In accordance with federal law, I had to retire from the commercial airline industry on my 65th birthday in 2015. I finished my flying career with over 24,000 hours of flying time. Aircraft I flew include the T-37, T-38, AT-38, F-11A/D/E/F/G and the Boeing 737-200/300/500/700/800. In retirement I play golf 4 to 5 times a week, am a member of the Baby Boomers Club, enjoy playing trivia, volunteering at PGA and charity golf tournaments, and singing karaoke. We have two sons. Cole, the oldest, has a BA in Musical Theater and performs onstage as a singer, dancer, and actor. Zackery has a Master of Fine Arts in Creative Writing and is currently a College English Professor and is working on his first novel. I look forward to returning to Chazy and seeing how much we have all changed in the last 50 years."

"After graduation I thought I would take some time off but my parents didn't agree, so I went to work for Ames Furniture in Plattsburgh delivering furniture for about a year. After being turned down for a pay raise at Ames I got a better job earning fifty cents an hour more at LaBarre's IGA, stocking shelves. Just a few days after my twenty-first birthday in 1970 I took the test for Correction Officer in the New York State Department of Corrections. During one of my advanced team trainings I was rappelling off the side of a six-story building in Troy, NY when I remembered that Mr. Brendler used to make us climb those damn ropes in gym and I always wondered what good that would ever do for me in the future. I laughed to myself and thought, "Maybe this is why. Thanks Mr.B."

After retirement I was elected to the Town of Plattsburgh Town Board and I was on the Town Board for six years with my last two years as Deputy Town Supervisor. Alumni Scholarship Eligibility

1. The applicant must be the son or daughter of a graduate of Chazy Central Rural School who is a member of the Chazy Alumni Association.
2. The parent/guardian must be a paid member of the Chazy Alumni Association for the preceding three years prior to and the year of the applicant's graduation. All dues must be paid by December 31 of those four years.
3. The applicant must be a graduating senior of Chazy Central Rural School who meets all requirements for graduation.
4. Applicant must plan to attend an institute of higher learning full-time.
5. Applicant must submit the application for the Chazy Alumni Scholarship by the deadline date, which is the second Friday of May, before 3:15 p.m. to the school guidance office.
6. The voting board of the Chazy Alumni Association will determine the amount of the scholarship annually. All decisions of the Chazy Alumni Association are final.
7. Payment of the scholarship will be made after the recipient has successfully completed his/her first semester of college and verifies that he/she has enrolled for a second semester of college.
